## SEATING ARRANGEMENTS FOR CANDIDATES

The diocese proposes that each candidate should sit in the pew with their family and sponsor for the ceremony as it is in our family that our faith is first formed and nurtured. Just as we are presented for Baptism by our family at the beginning of our faith journey, so now on their Confirmation Day each candidate is called forth from their family, together with their sponsor, to confirm that baptismal calling and commitment.

## **BEFORE THE CEREMONY BEGINS**

A few minutes before the ceremony begins it is useful for the school principal/a teacher/a member of the parish council to begin preparing the congregation for the celebration that is to follow. This is an opportunity to quieten the gathering, to remind them of the need to switch off their phones, not to take pictures during the ceremony and to invite them to be prayerfully present by participating fully and actively in the prayers and the hymns that are part of the ceremony. It is also an opportunity to ask the congregation to take a moment in quiet prayer for the candidates who are to be confirmed.

## ENTRANCE PROCESSION ALL STAND

An entrance hymn, led by the Choir of 4<sup>th</sup>-5<sup>th</sup> class students, that focuses on the theme of Confirmation and the gift of the Holy Spirit, should accompany the entrance procession. All the candidates should participate in the singing of this hymn and, where possible, the congregation should be encouraged to join them.

If the candidates take part in the procession they are followed in the procession by the priests and finally by the bishop.

#### **ALL SIT**

Now it is time for the bishop's words of welcome.

If a representative of the school, candidates or parents also want to say a few words of welcome, now is the right time to do it. (OPTIONAL)

Please remember that in these short words of welcome we express our joy that families, the parish and the school community are gathering in the church today to pray together and celebrate the Sacrament of Confirmation.

If the candidates will present symbols of their giftedness or of their work and preparation for receiving the Sacrament of Confirmation – now is the time in which to bring them forward. Have a space or table arranged off-centre in the sanctuary, where these symbols can be placed and be visible, but not in front of the altar or ambo and not on the altar. If a commentary accompanies the bringing forward of these symbols, it should be simple and brief. Symbols are brought forward by the candidates and presented to the bishop. (OPTIONAL)

## THEN ALL STAND

The bishop continues with the Sign of the Cross and the greeting: "Peace be with you."

## PENITENTIAL ACT and Kyrie

In general, there are two options for praying the Penitential Act:

## Option A:

The bishop first leads the congregation in praying the Confiteor ...... I confess to almighty God and to you my brothers and sisters............. and the bishop then leads the congregation in the response: Lord have mercy, Christ have mercy, Lord have mercy.

These responses should be sung (but can be spoken, if necessary): Lord have mercy or A Thiarna, déan trócaire or Kyrie eleison.

## Option B:

Alternatively, the Confiteor is not prayed and the bishop leads the Penitential Act as follows:

**Bishop**: Lord Jesus, you raise us to new life: Lord have mercy / A Thiarna déan trócaire

All: Lord have mercy / A Thiarna déan trócaire

**Bishop**: Lord Jesus, you forgive us our sins: *Christ have mercy / A Chriost déan trócaire* 

**All:** Christ have mercy / A Chriost déan trócaire

**Bishop:** Lord Jesus, you feed us with your body and blood: Lord have mercy / A Thiarna

déan trócaire

**All:** Lord have mercy / A Thiarna déan trócaire

#### **GLORIA**

The Gloria is included in the Confirmation liturgy, even during Lent. Where possible the Gloria should ideally be sung.

## † LITURGY OF THE WORD †

#### **ALL SIT**

It is not necessary to include the texts of the Scripture readings in the booklet but you may give the biblical references.

#### FIRST READING

The First Reading can be chosen from suggested Scripture Readings for the Liturgy of the Word.

#### **RESPONSORIAL PSALM**

The Responsorial Psalm should ideally be sung and is to be taken from the Biblical Psalms. The Responsorial Psalm ought not to be replaced with another hymn and is taken from the Responsorial Psalms included here.

## SECOND READING

The Second Reading can be chosen from Suggested Scripture Readings for the Liturgy of the Word.

## **ACCLAMATION BEFORE THE GOSPEL**

#### **ALL STAND**

The *Alleluia refrain (or the Lenten refrain)* is sung first by the choir / a cantor or a candidate for Confirmation, and then the whole congregation repeats the refrain. The verse is then sung and the refrain is repeated by everybody together.

During the Season of Lent, the response is sung in place of the Alleluia, for example 'Praise to vou Lord Jesus Christ, King of Eternal Glory'.

#### GOSPEL READING

The reading from the Gospel is proclaimed by the priest or deacon (who asks the bishop for the blessing before he proclaims the Gospel).

## PRESENTATION OF CANDIDATES (OPTIONAL)

## **ALL SIT**

The presentation of the candidates should take place straight after the Gospel as the first part of the Rites of the Sacrament of Confirmation.

After the Gospel the bishop stands at the presiding chair. The candidates for Confirmation may be presented by the class teacher/the principal/the priest. The nominated person says these or similar words: *These are the candidates who are to receive the sacrament of Confirmation today*. Then he/she calls the candidates by name. Each candidate stands when their name is called.

If there are very many candidates, they are not called by name. They are asked to stand to be presented to the bishop.

## **HOMILY ALL SIT**

The bishop then gives a brief homily.

## **ALL STAND**

An appropriate hymn invoking the power of the Holy Spirit may be sung. Suggestions are available here.

## THE CANDIDATES REMAIN STANDING WHILE THE REST OF THE CONGREGATION SITS

#### RENEWAL OF BAPTISMAL PROMISES

**Bishop:** Do you renounce Satan, and all his works and all his empty promises?

Candidates: I do.

**Bishop:** Do you believe in God, the Father almighty, Creator of heaven and earth?

Candidates: I do.

**Bishop:** Do you believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was born of the

Virgin Mary, suffered death and was buried, rose again from the dead and is

seated at the right hand of the Father?

Candidates: I do.

**Bishop:** Do you believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who came upon the

apostles at Pentecost and today is given to you sacramentally in Confirmation?

Candidates: I do.

**Bishop:** Do you believe in the holy Catholic Church, the communion of saints, the

forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting?

Candidates: I do.

**Bishop:** This is our faith. This is the faith of the Church.

We are proud to profess it in Christ Jesus our Lord.

All: Amen.

#### LAYING ON OF HANDS AND PRAYER OF CONSECRATION

#### **ALL STAND**

The bishop pronounces an invitation to prayer and then (the deacon) invites the CANDIDATES TO KNEEL.

During a moment of silent prayer, the Bishop extends his hands calling down the Holy Spirit and he prays the Prayer of Consecration.

## **ANOINTING WITH CHRISM**

#### **ALL SIT**

## THE CANDIDATES COME FORWARD TO BE CONFIRMED

The bishop takes his place at the front of the sanctuary. At this point the candidates begin to come forward. The bishop normally administers the anointing with both he and the candidates standing. This better expresses the symbolism of the candidate stepping into a new moment on their journey of faith.

Sponsors come forward and stand behind the candidate and place their right hand on the right shoulder of the candidate as a sign of their commitment to support the candidate in their journey of faith.

The class teacher introduces the candidate to the bishop by the Christian name. Then the Bishop usually has a chat with the candidate about his/her Confirmation name, the reason why it is being chosen, the sponsor, etc.

Then the Bishop (or the priest who administers the Sacrament with the Bishop that day) anoints the Candidate with Chrism, making the sign of the Cross on the forehead, saying:

**Bishop:** [Confirmation Name of Candidate] be sealed with the gift of the Holy Spirit.

Candidate: Amen.

**Bishop**: Peace be with you. **Candidate**: And with your spirit.

Gentle hymns or instrumental music can accompany the anointing.

#### GENERAL INTERCESSIONS / PRAYER OF THE FAITHFUL

#### **ALL STAND**

The newly confirmed young people are invited forward by the bishop to lead the prayer. There should be only 4-6 intercessions. The readers of the intercessions remain in the sanctuary until the bishop reads the concluding prayer.

## † LITURGY OF THE EUCHARIST †

## PREPARATION OF THE ALTAR AND PRESENTATION OF THE GIFTS

#### **ALL SIT**

The bread and wine only are brought in procession by some of the newly confirmed young people and presented to the bishop.

An Offertory Hymn or an instrumental piece of music may accompany the Offertory Procession. See list of 'Suggested Hymns and Music'.

The bishop invites the congregation to pray saying "Pray brothers and sisters ..." at which point EVERYBODY STANDS.

## **EUCHARISTIC PRAYER**

During the Eucharistic Prayer, the following responses shall be sung by all:

- Holy, Holy. [Sanctus]
- Memorial Acclamation.
- The Great Amen.

## **COMMUNION RITE**

## **ALL STAND**

The Lord's Prayer or the Ar nAthair may be sung or spoken.

The bishop invites the congregation to offer each other the Sign of Peace.

The Lamb of God [Agnus Dei] is sung (or may be spoken) while the bishop breaks the host.

## **ALL KNEEL**

Suitable Communion Hymns are sung by the candidates, the choir and the congregation during the distribution of Holy Communion (the hymns can begin when the bishop is receiving Holy Communion himself). Suggestions are available <a href="here">here</a>.

## POST-COMMUNION REFLECTION [OPTIONAL] ALL SIT

An appropriate spoken reflection, hymn or instrumental piece can be used.

## PRAYER AFTER COMMUNION

## **ALL STAND**

The Prayer after Communion is led by the bishop.

## WORDS OF THANKS [OPTIONAL] ALL SIT

A brief word of thanks by the newly confirmed young people / the parents/ the principal/ the priest may be offered, if it is considered appropriate.

Usually, the bishop addresses the congregation before the final blessing as well.

## RECESSIONAL HYMN ALL STAND

A suitable hymn with a Confirmation theme should be sung to conclude the liturgy. Suggestions are available here.

The newly confirmed young people remain standing with their sponsors and families in their seat for the final hymn. During the hymn the Bishop, the Priests and the altar servers leave the sanctuary, and the procession moves down the aisle. The newly confirmed young people and their families remain in their seat until the procession has concluded.

After the hymn, the Candidates may stand ready in front of the altar to have photographs taken with the bishop.
